This division of the company, under the management of Bob Ludlum, will engage in the engineering, installation and servicing of analyzers, including those of other manufacturers, as may be required for the continuous stream analyses of refineries and other process industries. Whereas the company previously has sold only individual instruments, the division will enable H.I. to supply complete automated systems of control instruments to

monitor a particular refinery process from start to finish, including the central controls coordinated lines and layout details.

The Systems Division's first contract involves most of the analyzers for the expansion at Shell Oil Co. refinery, Martinez.
